

## Addressing New Mexico's Health Provider Shortage

Advances in medical technology and implementing health reform can improve health outcomes and save lives, but without increasing access to health providers at all levels, improved health is out of reach for many people in New Mexico. Con Alma HEALTH Foundation has committed to investment in workforce development to address provider shortages. The following Con Alma funded programs are leveraging support from all three sectors:



### PROJECT DIVERSITY

Con Alma HEALTH Foundation is also investing in nursing's future through Project DIVERSITY, a unique partnership between Con Alma HEALTH Foundation, the New Mexico Community Foundation, University of New Mexico Hospitals Nursing Division, and the UNM Office of Diversity. Together we are taking steps to create a nursing pipeline with an eye toward a diverse workforce.

Project DIVERSITY is part of a national program known as Partners Investing in Nursing's Future led by the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation and the Northwest Health Foundation. Middle- and high-school students who are Hispanic, Native American, African American or other students of color are pursuing their dream of joining the health care workforce with a nurse mentor by her or his side. With intensive tutoring, mentoring, experiential learning opportunities and a structured curriculum that prepares them for the rigors of a nursing program, these students will be ready to take next steps into their future.

## **National**

### NATIONAL CAC CONVENING

In April 2008, Con Alma and Grantmakers in Health convened Community Advisory Committees (CACs) of health foundations from across the country in Santa Fe, NM to discuss strategies for effective ways to engage the community. Community Advisory Committees were established as part of health conversion foundations to increase community engagement and assist with assessment of community health needs.

The 2008 event's success led to a follow-up national convening in May 2009 in Portland, Maine. "The current economic crisis is challenging funders and the people they serve in dramatic ways and will have both short-term and long-term implications for philanthropy and the nonprofit sector – and indeed for all of us. At times like this, the role of CACs in fostering community engagement will be even more important," said Scott Benbow, attorney and philanthropy specialist, and Dolores E. Roybal, Con Alma Executive Director, in the December 2008 issue of Grantmakers in Health Bulletin.

## PARTNERS INVESTING IN NURSING'S FUTURE

Partners Investing in Nursing's Future (PIN) is a partnership of the Northwest Health Foundation and the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation supporting local foundations to invest in nursing workforce solutions. Partners Investing in Nursing's Future is helping local and regional philanthropies develop solutions to the nursing workforce shortage. Project DIVERSITY is a PIN initiative (see page 3).

Partners Investing in Nursing's Future is a unique collaboration of the philanthropic community to foster innovations that help address the nursing crisis. The result of such collaboration from local to national levels can create a domino effect – where innovative ideas are tested locally and shared nationally. ### ORAL HEALTH IN NEW MEXICO

New Mexico has a reverence for history and tradition balanced with a yen for innovation. Our culture values tradition and seeks innovative solutions. New Mexicans are able to explore ideas for systemic change like adding a new oral health practitioner to the dental team – a dental therapist. Would a model like this address the need for quality oral health providers in the rural areas of New Mexico? Would it expand services to New Mexicans who right now have little or no access to dental services? What are ways to ensure quality of care for all New Mexicans? Would this be a good job opportunity for people in New Mexico? Are dentists willing to partner with dental therapists? This model might be the key to improving access to oral health in New Mexico. We are not certain where this exploration will lead us, but New Mexico must not fear the journey.



### HIP

Hispanics in Philanthropy's (HIP) New Mexico Funders' Collaborative awarded \$160,000 to support Latino communities in New Mexico. Con Alma HEALTH Foundation is honored to join other local funders as part of HIP New Mexico - Abelard Foundation, Con Alma, New Mexico Community Foundation, Nirvana Mañana Institute, Oppenheimer Brothers Fund, Ronald Simon Family Foundation, and Santa Fe Community Foundation. These funders pooled their money with the knowledge that Hispanics in Philanthropy will match their donations one-for-one, therefore increasing the total amount of grantmaking dollars going to Latino communities in New Mexico. Grants were awarded to 14 Latino-led and Latino-serving nonprofits in different program areas and geographic regions of New Mexico. More information is available at www.hiponline.org.

## PRE-PROPOSAL AND TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE WORKSHOPS

Con Alma HEALTH Foundation provided free pre-proposal and technical assistance workshops in seven locations around New Mexico. Nonprofit organizations met in Gallup, Silver City, Roswell, Las Vegas, Santa Fe, Albuquerque and Las Cruces to hear about Con Alma grant opportunities and learn about other possible funding sources, in collaboration with New Mexico Association of Grantmakers.

### DATA FOR GRANT MAKING

The Northern New Mexico Health Grant Group (NNMHGG), a joint initiative with the Auxiliary of the Los Alamos Medical Center and Con Alma HEALTH Foundation, released a study entitled, "Data for Grant-Making: A Comparative Study of Community Health in Los Alamos, Rio Arriba & Northern Santa Fe Counties." In Spring 2008, the NNMHGG decided to conduct an assessment of health status priorities and health care systems challenges. ## HEALTH IS MORE THAN HEALTH CARE

In December 2007, the New Mexico Health Equity Working Group (NMHEWG) began in response to the state's health disparities and to the documentary "Unnatural Causes: Is Inequality Making Us Sick?" The series presents compelling evidence that social conditions – the jobs we do, the money we're paid, the schools we attend, the neighborhoods we live in – are as important to our health as our genes, our behaviors and even our medical care.

The NMHEWG's Mission is to promote health equity in New Mexico by: Reframing the predominant view of health to include and address social determinants of health; Connecting individuals, communities, and organizations to work together towards health equity and; Advocating for ethical policies that eliminate or mitigate disparities and inequalities that affect health.

A 2008 Con Alma grant recipient, the NMHEWG has begun harnessing the power of cross-sector collaboration. Members include the Bernalillo County Community Health Council, Bernalillo County Environmental Health, NM Dept of Health/Public Health Division/Health Systems Bureau, New Mexico Health Policy Commission, New Mexico Public Health Association, New Mexico Voices for Children, South Valley Partnership for Environmental Justice, St. Joseph Community Health, UNM Institute for Public Health, UNM – RWJF Center for Health Policy, and YWCA-NM. 




